SPOTLIGHT ON....

Dorothy Hile



After 81 years at St. Paul's, Dorothy will say goodbye on December 4, to begin the next phase of her life journey, at the home of her son Dick and daughter-in-law Wendy, in Ann Arbor. Lovingly she reflects on her time spent here and with her family, saying, "What I will miss most is Sharon (Sharon Balk, her niece and also part of the St. Paul's congregation) and St. Paul's. I love my St. Paul's family and will miss them greatly."

Dorothy was born in Ida, Michigan, on January 3, 1923, so now approaches her 96th birthday. Her father was a lifelong farmer and her mother a stay-at-home wife and mother of eight children, six girls and two boys. When she was just two years old, the family moved from Ida to Patterson Dr. in Monroe, and she would attend Waterloo School for her elementary education. Because no high school was near the family home, her secondary education took place at Monroe High School, living with her sister Hazel. As a young child, she attended church with her family at the Evangelical United Brethren church, but came to St. Paul's with her sister, responded to "an altar call" and has been part of the St. Paul's family since she was 14 years old.

While in high school, she met and began dating her future husband, Ken Hile. He graduated a year earlier than Dorothy, went to service and was stationed in Ipswich, Massachusetts. They were married in 1943, and shortly thereafter he was transferred to Virginia Beach, Virginia, where, after a short time back in Monroe, she joined him.

They would eventually make their permanent home in Monroe, and raised their four children here. Kathy was the first child, then John, David and Richard.

After graduation from high school, Dorothy was recommended for a job at Monroe Auto Equipment and became an executive secretary there.

After returning to Monroe when Ken was discharged from the military, she was able to return to that position, where she stayed until she was expecting her first child, Kathy. It was not until Kathy was in the 11th grade that Dorothy went to work again; this time for Monroe Public Schools, as the secretary at Raisinville Elementary School. A tenure of over 20 years was spent there when she finally retired. Ken had already retired from his position at Time Container in Monroe, and it was then they began their extensive travels: they visited every state in the United States except North Dakota! Her husband passed away in 2003, just 3 months before their 60th wedding anniversary.

All Dorothy's siblings have passed away, but 18 nephews and nieces are part of her ever-growing family. She has 8 grandchildren, 5 great grandchildren and 2 more coming in February!

She describes her hobbies, mainly as reading, but did a great deal of sewing when the children were young, and "made a lot of doll clothes!"

Her service at St. Paul's has been extensive! She has served on every committee of the church, except Finance, has chaired many, and devoted a great deal of time and energy to all the programs and activities.

Editor's Note: St. Paul's loses one of its best disciples at the moving of Dorothy Hile, and will grieve at her having to make the change. But we wish her well, thank her for her lengthy service to her church and to the Lord she has made the center of her life for all of her almost-96 years!

January 2019 - Effective Stewardship Applying Bible Principles

“ . . . if anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation: everything old has passed away . . . everything has become new” (2 Cor. 5:17). Christians should have a different outlook on life, including money and material possessions. They realize that they own nothing, that everything they have belongs to God, and that they are only managers and stewards of what God has entrusted to them. Because of that, Christians should have a different attitude towards “things.”

That attitude demonstrates itself in many different ways. For example, Christians show mercy and give, in contrast to those who borrow and do not repay (Psalm 37:21). Christians should hold possessions with an

open hand, and “refresh” others with their bounty (Proverbs 11:24-25). They are honest and demonstrate their faith by their work and integrity (1 Thes. 4:11-12). They give to those in need and thereby demonstrate to a watching world the love of God (1 John 3:17).

When this kind of lifestyle is present in our lives, Jesus said that people will see our good works — our different attitude and perspective — and will glorify our heavenly Father (Matt. 5:16). And as we seek His kingdom first and foremost, we have His promise that He will provide what we need (Matt. 6:33).

As others observe you and your lifestyle, do they see any difference because of your faith in the Lord Jesus Christ? As they observe your relationship to “things,” especially to money, do they realize you are a manager, a steward, and not an owner? Or stated another way, is the manner in which you handle money and material possessions a testimony to your faith in Christ?
